It seeks to educate the public, teach teachers, train students, and offer ideas to advance U.S. national interests based on a nonpartisan, geopolitical perspective that illuminates contemporary international affairs through the lens of history, geography, and culture.

#### **INFORMING**

Informing the American Public – When FPRI founder Robert Strausz-Hupé penned his classic book *Protracted Conflict* in the 1950s, he envisaged the Cold War as taking place over several decades and was concerned that a democratic polity would not have the wherewithal to stick it out for the long haul unless it understood the nature of the conflict. Hence, from its inception, FPRI placed a premium on educating the American people because, without an educated citizenry, the US would not be able to conduct a coherent foreign policy.

#### **VETTING**

Where Great Minds Meet – FPRI is fortunate to be located in the vicinity of over 60 institutions of higher learning, and we are happy to be the neutral meeting place for some of the finest minds in the country – from UPenn, Princeton, Haverford, Swarthmore, Temple, and Rutgers, among others. But we are not limited to our vicinity, as we maintain relationships with scholars and think tanks throughout the nation and the world.

#### **MENTORING**

Teaching the Teachers – Alone among think tanks, FPRI is known for "the history thing"; a reference to our Marvin Wachman Center for Civic and International Literacy and our Madeleine and W. W. Keen Butcher History Institute for high school teachers, a series of intensive weekend-long conferences on selected topics in US and world history, and international relations.

### 2015 HIGHLIGHTS

This year we celebrated FPRI's 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary as well as the 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary of our Marvin Wachman Center for Civic and International Literacy. That's 60 years of producing policy-relevant scholarship to preserve American security, and 25 years of educating the community and teaching teachers – not just here in Philadelphia but around the country.

However, our aim here is not to applaud ourselves for what we've accomplished over the past 60 years but rather to showcase just the initiatives we have launched this year to keep FPRI fresh, vigorous, and unpredictable.

FPRI provides insightful geopolitical analysis that makes a real difference in the policy world, in the community, and in the classroom – but what about its reach? Today, FPRI reaches an electronic audience of hundreds of thousands, spread among virtually every nation of the world nearly every day. Because of this outreach, FPRI has become a magnet for fresh, young talent – young scholars who wish to make a mark on the world, and see FPRI as an excellent platform from which to do so.

This year we introduced several new innovations to help them do just that:



- <u>V-Notes:</u> video essays that combine scholarly rigor with rare footage to illuminate little known but significant developments in the Middle East.
- FPRI Double Shot: our weekly podcast delivering the week's news in two minutes or less.
- FPRI Infographics: popular in social media, these can be powerful and efficient tools to convey a vast amount of information.
- The Robert A. Fox Fellows Program: an addition to our Middle East Program designed to expand our writing, speaking, and media activities, with the appointment of <u>Clint Watts</u>, <u>Sam Helfont</u>, <u>Adam Garfinkle</u>, and <u>Tamar Friedman</u>.
- A week-long study trip to South Korea for 28 high school teachers, building on 53 weekend-long history institutes for over 1000 faculty from 750 schools in 47 states.

• The Best of FPRI Collections: e-books representing the work of each of our research programs over the last 10 years, including Michael Noonan on National Security, Tally Helfont on the Middle East, Ron Granieri on America and the West, Maia Otarashvili on Democratic Transitions, and Jacques deLisle on East Asia.











• **FPRI Insights:** a weekly compilation of essays by our scholars, citations in the media, or other institutional news. As you have seen from these emails, our scholars have been featured prominently in various media outlets all over the world. This year our scholars have appeared in the following outlets, among many others:



#### PRODUCTIVITY & REACH

In 2015, FPRI's <u>Program on National Security</u> had 29 affiliated scholars—dispersed from the Delaware Valley to around the globe—who were prodigiously productive. Six books were published by our scholars and numerous long- and short-form articles appeared in leading policy and scholarly outlets on matters pertaining to myriad aspects of national security, broadly defined. In an FPRI first, our Fellow Joshua Foust had a long-form article in *Playboy* magazine!

FPRI also hosted diverse national security-related programming in New York City, Princeton, Philadelphia, the Main Line, and Washington D.C. These programs increased civic literacy by bringing in leading voices to discuss important dimensions of international security issues affecting American national interests today and into the future.

2016 will show even more growth with the addition of a new program on the study of competitive soft power along with other individual and collective research projects.

#### MEDIA HIGHLIGHTS

FPRI's Program on National Security scholars in 2015 appeared on or were quoted in major television, print, and online news media outlets, to include, but not limited to: Wall Street Journal, Financial Times, Foreign Affairs, Bloomberg, MSNBC, NBC News, Christian Science Monitor, NPR's All Things Considered, Defense One, Defense News, Vox, Daily Beast, Slate, Buzzfeed, TV Newsroom, Army Magazine, CTX Journal, WHYY's Radio Times, Voice of America, and CBS 3 Evening News.

#### **60**<sup>TH</sup> ANNIVERSARY COLLECTION

In honor of FPRI's 60th anniversary, the Program on National Security produced a 488-page edited volume that highlighted the best writings produced in FPRI E-Notes and Footnotes on national security-related themes over the past decade. The Best of FPRI's Essays on the National Security, 2005-2015 featured articles on diverse topics such as the post-9/11 wars, grand strategy, civil-military relations, defense policy, military culture, military and non-military tools, nuclear issues, terrorism, irregular warfare, great power politics, and the future security environment.



#### TEST OF CONCEPT: GOOGLE HANGOUTS

The Program on National Security experimented with a new dissemination platform in 2015 to expand the reach of FPRI programming: Google Hangouts. On March 13 of this year, Michael Noonan moderated a panel on the role of foreign fighters in the war in Syria with FPRI's Clint Watts, The Brookings Institution's Will McCants, and the Philadelphia Inquirer's Trudy Rubin. This unique platform allowed us to have a live panel discussion with four geographically dispersed participants that was then automatically uploaded to YouTube to be watched at any time by interested parties. This platform will be used more in 2016 to respond to timely topics.

#### ASSIST: 2015 TEACHING MILITARY HISTORY INSTITUTE

Michael Noonan, the Director of the Program on National Security, assisted the Madeleine and W.W. Keen Butcher History Institute in planning and designing the 11<sup>th</sup> Teaching Military History Institute. 2015's Teaching Military History Institute dealt with the important topic of the Ethical Dilemmas in American Warfare and brought together leading historians, policy experts, and legal scholars to address the ethical dimensions of teaching American history on issues ranging from civil liberties and state security to economic warfare to strategic bombing to the use of nuclear weapons to state surveillance. The varying opinions of the assembled participants ensured that much lively discussion and reflection were provided to address this sometimes neglected issue.

In 2015, FPRI's Middle East program – comprised of <u>17 scholars</u> based both locally and globally – was extremely active, publishing regularly on critical developments and trends in the Middle East through its various publication series, and in prestigious external venues.

In 2015, FPRI's Middle East program was proud to announce that it named four Fox Fellows, who would spend the year (2015-2016) writing, speaking, and creating innovative platforms and resources on a wide range of timely issues related to the Middle East and North Africa, and U.S. policy therein. Sponsored by Robert A. Fox, these Fellows were chosen on the

basis of their erudite contributions to FPRI in the past, and their ability to respond to contemporary developments in the region in a sound and timely fashion, based on FPRI's focus on geopolitical analysis.

#### MEDIA HIGHLIGHTS

FPRI's Middle East scholars and trustees were cited and quoted extensively in 2015 in major online and print news media, including, but not limited to, the following outlets:

FPRI Fox Fellow Clint Watts, who focuses on ISIS, Al-Qaeda, and their recruits, was the most often cited and quoted scholar this year, totaling +45 citations in 2015 in many of the news outlets featured above. What's more, his writings on behalf of FPRI were also routinely featured by third party news aggregates, such as Foreign Policy Magazine's daily news brief on the region.



FPRI Middle East Director <u>Tally Helfont</u> was featured in August 2015 on Women in Foreign Policy (#wifp) – an organization geared at young women as well as women seeking a career in foreign policy. #### 60TH ANNIVERSARY COLLECTION



In honor of FPRI's 60th anniversary, the Middle Eat program produced a 181-page edited volume, showcasing a taste of the quality analysis it produced on a diverse array of topics over the past decade. The Best of FPRI's Essays on the Middle East, 2005-2015 features scholarship on perennial themes such as authoritarianism and reform; the Arab uprisings and its aftermath; radicalism and regional threats; sectarian divisions; and the Arab-Israeli conflict and peace efforts.

#### FPRI V-NOTES – VIDEO ESSAYS

FPRI launched yet another new platform to disseminate its research called V-Notes. Created by Senior Fellow <u>Joseph Braude</u> exclusively for FPRI's Middle East program, V-Notes are video essays fusing scholarly rigor, rare footage, and innovative analysis to kickstart new conversations about American foreign policy toward the Arab world and beyond.

Episode 1 - The Identity Machine shows how an Iraqi comic, an Algerian military recruitment video, and a musical sketch from the American TV show "Schoolhouse Rock" illuminate the defining challenge of Arab politics for a generation to come.



Episode 2 - Korean Arabia shows how South Korea's star is rising in the Arab world, while its challenge to support reform in the region has only just begun.

#### 2015 MIDDLE EAST HISTORY INSTITUTE

This year's weekend-long Middle East History Institute was held in Philadelphia on "Understanding the Modern Middle East: History, Identity, and Politics," and explored the nexus of identity and politics from the pre-modern period to the current day and beyond – with lectures by some of the best scholars in the country. Generously supported by Robert Fox and Gerry Lenfest, it was a great success by all accounts. ### CENTER FOR THE STUDY OF AMERICA AND THE WEST

2015 was a difficult year for the West, full of historical anniversaries of world war and genocide, ongoing wars in the Middle East and Ukraine, as well as current disputes over economics, migration, and border security. All have reinforced the importance of understanding the West's place in history and the contemporary world.

As it has done since its founding, the <u>Center for the Study of America</u> and the West has taken up the challenge of describing and discussing


the West's geopolitical significance, and has also been one of the leaders of FPRI's efforts to reach both a scholarly audience and a broader public through its publications and multimedia programs.

#### TEACHING MILITARY HISTORY


Over the past 10 years, FPRI has assumed the leading role in providing professional development to high school teachers in the area of American military history (as part of a larger program on teaching world history, American history, and international relations). The premise of this program is that all Americans are responsible for the common defense and therefore all should know something about it. The First Division Museum in Wheaton, IL has cosponsored and hosted the annual military history institute, and Carthage College has cosponsored it while providing graduate credit to participating teachers. In 2015, we focused on Ethical Dilemmas in American Military History, uniquely appealing to teachers and students because grappling with dilemmas, we find, is what students most like to do.


#### GEOPOLITICS WITH GRANIERI

Geopolitics with Granieri, our monthly interview program hosted by the Center's Executive Director, Ronald Granieri, which debuted in January 2013, has now produced 35 hour-long conversations between prominent guests and FPRI members. Guests in 2015 offered a wide range of perspectives on topics spanning the globe. Although the scope of the topics covered spreads beyond the conventionally understood boundaries of the West, the program as a whole reflects FPRI's and the Center's commitment to free and open debate and to curiosity about the larger world, each key values of Western Civilization.









Several prominent scholars presented their recent books to the <u>Geopolitics with Granieri</u> audience in 2015, including Will McCants of the Brookings Institution who presented his bestseller, *The ISIS Apocalypse* and Sean Naylor, who presented his history of the Joint Strike Command, *Relentless* Strike; as well as FPRI Senior Fellows Michael Horowitz, who discussed his new book on *Why Leaders Fight*, and Colin Dueck, who introduced *The Obama Doctrine*. FPRI area experts also appeared on the program to discuss world hot spots: Vanessa Neumann on Venezuela and South America; John Haines on the Iran Deal; Chris Miller on Putin's Russia; Michael Noonan on War and Intellectuals; and Lawrence Husick on Cybersecurity. Recordings of all those events are available through the FPRI website and also through SoundCloud.

#### THE FPRI DOUBLE SHOT



Fall 2015 also saw the unveiling of the <u>FPRI Double Shot</u> – weekly roundup of world events in two minutes or less, written and presented by Ron Granieri in cooperation with Executive Producer Eli Gilman, aims to provide listeners with a stimulating and fast-paced look at the events of the previous week, and has touched on everything from climate talks in Paris to the terrorist attacks in Paris and San Bernardino to the Republican and Democratic races for the Presidency.

#### 60TH ANNIVERSARY ESSAY COLLECTION



In honor of FPRI's 60<sup>th</sup> Anniversary, the Center was proud to publish <u>The Best of FPRI's Essays on America and the West, 1993-2015</u>, a collection of articles, speeches, and conference reports produced by Center scholars over the past decades. Including classic essays by FPRI Founder Robert Strausz-Hupé; former FPRI President Harvey Sicherman; and such prominent scholars as William McNeill, Walter McDougall, James Kurth, and Jeremy Black, as well as recent works by younger scholars and reports on our History Institutes, this collection reflects the rich and varied history of the Center and its contributions to an ongoing dialogue about the past, present, and future of the West.

#### CENTER SCHOLARS IN FPRI LECTURE SERIES AND PUBLICATIONS

In 2015, Center Scholars have also made presentations within other FPRI lecture and publication series. Ronald Granieri and Jakub Grygiel each spoke in FPRI's 2015 Ginsburg Lecture Series, Granieri on "What is Geopolitics and Why Does it Matter?" and Grygiel on "Russia, Ukraine, and the Geopolitics of Europe." Both of those lectures were posted to YouTube, where they have each been viewed more than 7,500 times, then published in the Fall 2015 issue of *Orbis*. In 2015, we were pleased to cosponsor a teacher institute with the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga on US Foreign Policy and American National Interests, featuring talks by FPRI scholars Clint Watts, Lawrence Husick, Jacques deLisle, and Lucien Ellington.

#### AMERICAN REVIEW OF BOOKS, BLOGS, AND BULL

In 2015, the Center also offered a sneak preview of an exciting upcoming venture, <u>The American Review of Books, Blogs, and Bull</u>, a monthly electronic journal that will offer reviews and commentary on political and cultural publications. The *American Review* hopes to expand FPRI's intellectual reach and its audience, as it engages in dialogue with the myriad print and online sources that crowd the media landscape.

### ASIA PROGRAM

### Director: Jacques deLisle

#### PRODUCTIVITY & REACH

In 2015, the <u>Asia Program</u>'s 17 affiliated scholars published, spoke and were quoted widely and often on key developments and trends in Asia, including East Asia, South Asia and Southeast Asia. Asia Program scholars published five edited volumes on policy-relevant issues in the region, including the challenges facing China today, security relations in Northeast Asia, developments in Taiwan and cross-Strait relations

since 2008, and the failure of international relations theory to account for developments in Asia in recent decades. Their writings also appeared in leading journals in the field, including Foreign Affairs, Foreign Policy, the National Interest, the National Review, the Journal of Strategic Studies, the National Bureau of Asian Research's Asia Policy, the Journal of Contemporary China, World Politics Review, the Diplomat, the American Journal of International Law, and Eurasia Review, as well as Orbis.

The Asia Program published nearly 20 E-Notes and Footnotes on topics ranging from the Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank to Taiwan's upcoming elections, to the South China Dea disputes, China's rising military capacity, and the Obama Administration's "rebalance" to Asia. *Orbis* included 10 articles on Asia topics, including the strategic implications of China's rise, Sino-Japanese naval rivalry, Indian defense policy, the Trans-Pacific Partnership, and the Russian Far East. FPRI's blog, *Geopoliticus*, posted 15 entries on Asia-related topics, principally by FPRI Senior Fellow Felix Chang, specializing in the geopolitics and geo-economics of East Asia. (A man of many talents, Chang was named Assistant Professor of Surgery this year at the Uniformed Services University/Walter Reed National Medical Center in recognition of his work in developing simulations related to the mission of the Center.) Asia Program Senior Fellow Gilbert Rozman edits the Asan Forum, an online journal of Asian affairs that this year featured contributions by Rozman and other Asia Program affiliates.

The FPRI Asia Program's Annual Conference, held in Washington in cooperation with the Woodrow Wilson International Center, brought together a dozen leading scholars for a full-day event to address Blurring Borders: National, Subnational, and Regional Orders in East Asia. The conference led to an FPRI Conference Report and several articles in *Orbis*. In addition to Philadelphia-based programs, Asia Program Senior scholars spoke at FPRI events on the Main Line, in Miami, and in Dallas (in collaboration with the Dallas World Affairs Council).

Granieri, featuring Ambassador Lyushun Shen of Taiwan, and FPRI's Ginsburg Lecture on "China's Rise and the Geopolitics of Asia" by Asia Program Senior Fellow June Teufel Dreyer.

#### SUPPORTING TEACHING ABOUT ASIA

After sponsoring 53 weekend-long history institutes in the United States on a variety of topics in American and world history and international relations, FPRI held its first week-long study trip for teachers outside the United States. We brought 28 high school teachers from 16 states to South Korea for a week of immersion in Korean history and culture. The trip was divided between lectures on Korean history, economics, geography and education and trips to museums, shrines, temples – and the DMZ. According to post-trip evaluations, the participating teachers rated the trip as "excellent" and "among the best travel experiences" in their lives. The trip was led by Mark Peterson, a professor of Korean studies at Brigham Young University and a Senior Fellow of FPRI, and Paul Dickler, Associate Director of FPRI's Wachman Center for Civic and International Literacy.

#### **60TH ANNIVERSARY COLLECTION**



In honor of FPRI's 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary, the Asia Program issued <u>a collection of FPRI's essays on Asia-related topics</u>, primarily from the last decade. Featuring work by Asia Program affiliates and other scholars, the selections address important developments and perennial themes such as: China's rise and its implications for regional international relations and U.S. foreign policy, international security and great power relations in Asia, regional economic integration and its consequences, and Taiwan and cross-Strait relations.

#### FPRI'S ASIA PROGRAM AND U.S. FOREIGN POLICY IN PRACTICE

Asia Program Director Jacques deLisle and Senior Fellow Shelley Rigger both contributed to briefings on China organized by the National Committee on U.S.-China Relations for the U.S. Pacific Command, and on Taiwan's politics for members of the U.S. government intelligence and foreign policy communities. DeLisle was a member of the U.S. delegation to the U.S.-China Rule of Law Experts Dialogue in Beijing—a Track 1.5 session led on the U.S. side by Assistant Secretary of State for Democracy, Human Rights and Labor Tom Malinowski. Asia Program Senior Fellow June Teufel Dreyer participated in a State Department-sponsored Track II meeting with Chinese academics and officials in Beijing.

#### **NEW SCHOLARS**

This year the PDT Team welcomed four new scholars to its ranks. In March we welcomed Dr. Mitchell Orenstein as Senior Fellow. Dr. Orenstein is a Professor of Central and East European politics in the Slavic department of the University of Pennsylvania. Professor Orenstein's published work has explored the political economy of transition in Central and Eastern Europe, pension privatization worldwide, and the role of policy paradigms in economic reform.










In June we welcomed a new Research Associate – Christine Philippe-Blumauer. She holds a Master's degree in Peace and Security Studies from the University of Hamburg, Germany; and a French-German B.A. in Political Science/European Studies from Sciences Po Lille, France and the Westfälische Wilhelms-Universität in Münster, Germany. Her current research is focused on the South Caucasus and Eurasian Customs Union. In September we welcomed Dr. Anna Mikulska as Fellow. Dr. Mikulska is a nonresident scholar in energy studies at the Baker Institute, Rice University, Houston. Her research interests include eastern European politics, European energy markets and energy policy. In December Tamari Ramishvili is PDT Research Associate. She is currently working towards her MA in Public Policy at American University, with a concentration in International Development. She holds a dual BA from Rutgers University in Philosophy and Political Science, with a minor in National Security, CIA, and Counterintelligence.

#### 2015 Publications


In 2015, PDT scholars published 32 FPRI E-Notes and Geopoliticus blogs. These and our previous year's articles by PDT scholars continuously dominate the annual as well as the monthly list of FPRI's top 25 publications. Particularly, our coverage of the Ukraine crisis and Russia enjoys thousands of

unique readers monthly. Notably, Adrian Basora's E-Note on <u>Vladimir Putin's interests in Ukraine</u>, Maia Otarashvili's E-Note on the <u>Russian annexation of South Ossetia</u>, and Michael Cecire's E-Note on the <u>Russian invasion of Ukraine</u> have been viewed by over 100,000 unique readers combined thus far. PDT scholars also published and were cited and quoted in over 30 articles in other major online and print news media including *Foreignpolicy.com*, *Democracy Lab*, *Democracy Digest*, *National Interest*, *Atlantic Council*, *Foreign Affairs*, *EurasiaNet*, *The Russian International Affairs Council*, *The Diplomat*, *The New Atlanticist*, and *Newsweek*.



In honor of FPRI's 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary, PDT produced a 240-page edited volume, showcasing some of the best publications by PDT over its 10 years of existence. This e-book has enjoyed thousands of views and was featured in Democracy Lab on foreignpolicy.com, and in the National Endowment for Democracy's Democracy Digest.





#### TWO MAJOR BOOK PROJECTS

Our successful October 2014 conference co-sponsored with the Kennan Institute at the Woodrow Wilson Center in Washington, DC, entitled "Does Democracy Matter?" inspired a year-long book project on US democracy promotion (forthcoming in 2016). Authors of these chapters include eminent scholars and practitioners like Larry Diamond, Carl Gershman, Nick Gvosdev, Tsveta Petrova, and Michal Koran, as well as PDT's own scholars including Adrian Basora, Melinda Haring, Sarah Bush, Richard Kraemer, and Agnieszka Marczyk. This year long book project included six FPRI study groups with chapter authors. The goal of this e-book is to assess the role of democracy promotion in the US foreign policy agenda, and make tangible policy recommendations as to how, when, and where it should be done more effectively going forward.

In addition to this e-book, the PDT team has compiled an electronic interactive "E-guide on Democratization." This guidebook (forthcoming in spring 2016) will be a compilation of the Project's ten year-long research and findings and will examine a vast number of democracy-related issues, from the best definitions and measurements of democracy to more complex matters such as crucial positive conditions for and major challenges to achieving successful democratization. We see this project as most beneficial to the future leaders of emerging democracies, as well as for students and advocates of democracy all over the world.

#### WHAT 2016 HOLDS: AN INITIATIVE ON EURASIA

The year 2015 marked not only the Project's 10th anniversary but also a decade of profound change in Central and Eastern Europe and Eurasia and its surroundings, particularly in light of Russia's assertive position within the region. We are thus establishing a new FPRI Eurasia program. Building upon our existing strengths and momentum, this Eurasia initiative will continue to analyze the ebb and flow of democratization in the post-communist states but will also focus more comprehensively on the geopolitical, economic, security and energy issues central to the overall dynamics of the region. Our new *Baltic Bulletin* will advance knowledge of political, economic, and cultural trends in the Baltics while providing a platform for voices from the Baltics, including members of indigenous think tanks and educational institutions.

### OTHER FPRI INITIATIVES

### CENTER FOR THE STUDY OF TERRORISM

#### Chairs: Lawrence Husick & Edward Turzanski

In a relatively short time, ISIS has come to dominate the global jihadi arena, boasting its own state that incorporates parts of Syria and Iraq, spurring offshoots elsewhere in the Middle East, North Africa, Sub-Saharan Africa, and South Asia. At the same time, through sophisticated use of social media it has recruited foreign fighters from all over the world while inspiring others in the West to wreak havoc at home. Moreover, it has engaged in a deadly competition with its

parent institution, Al Qaeda. Assessing the strengths and vulnerabilities of terrorist movements, and policy responses to them, is the main burden of FPRI's <u>Center for the Study of Terrorism</u>.

The Center is chaired by Lawrence Husick, a specialist on technology and terrorism, and Edward Turzanski, a former member of the US intelligence community, each of whom appears regularly in local and national media, while lecturing to community groups around the country, including in 2015 the Pacific and Asian Affairs Council in Honolulu and the World Affairs Councils of Anchorage and Juneau (Alaska). The Center draws on scholars in our National Security Program and our Middle East Program, among them —

- Barak Mendelsohn, author of The Al Qaeda Franchise: The Expansion of al-Qaeda and Its Consequences (Oxford University Press, 2015) and of numerous articles in Foreign Affairs
- Clint Watts, a former FBI special agent on a Joint Terrorism Task Force, now known for his work on tracking jihadis online; author of numerous blogs for *War on the Rocks* and FPRI's blog *Geopoliticus*, and a guest on CNN
- Lorenzo Vidino, heads the Program on Extremism at George Washington University which published his 2015 report "ISIS in America"
- Vanessa Neumann, author of a forthcoming book on crime-terror pipelines (Palgrave Macmillan, 2017) and contributor to the OECD report "Illicit Trade: Converging Criminal Networks"

### JOHN TEMPLETON FELLOW

### Senior Fellow Edward J. Turzanski

Edward Turzanski, who is also co-chair of FPRI's Center for the Study of Terrorism, is tasked with providing timely, accurate analysis on critical challenges to US national security to the media community groups, civic and business leaders; and elected and appointed government officials (across the political spectrum). He covers security concerns related to large-scale domestic events and venues, geopolitical implications of US energy capabilities, allied perceptions of US foreign policy, and US responses to challenges posed by ISIS, Iran, Russia, and China. In 2015, he gave 114 radio and television interviews, delivered formal remarks in 41 public appearances, and met privately with

numerous security officials. Formerly with the US intelligence community, he taught at La Salle University and is a regular panelist on "Inside Story," a weekly news show on ABC affiliate WPVI TV in Philadelphia. He is President of the Board of Directors of the National Aerospace Training and Research (NASTAR) Center Educational Foundation, a Member of the Aria Health Foundation Board, and a Member of the Board of Directors of the Union League of Philadelphia.

### FIELD RESEARCH SCHOLARSHIP

#### Senior Fellow David Danelo

In 2015, FPRI's <u>Program on Field Research</u> further developed the core training curriculum and completed research and analysis worldwide. The year's two biggest accomplishments were an extended field research project in Germany in the spring, and acceptance for 2016 publication of the core curriculum by a major academic publisher.

In March 2015, field research program director <u>David Danelo</u> traveled to Germany, the Netherlands, and the Denmark/Sweden border to analyze evolving geopolitical events in northern Europe. His three-part series, <u>Germany in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century</u>, forecasted Europe's 2015 refugee crisis, predicted Germany's response to the unprecedented events, and explained the dilemma both the country and the continent would confront in 2016 and the coming decade.

The program was also proud to announce publication pending in 2016 of a textbook developed from our curriculum. In 2015, Georgetown University Press accepted Danelo's *The Field Research Handbook: A Guide to the Art and Science of Professional Fieldwork*. At year end, the manuscript is in final edits and is slated for late summer 2016 publication.

Events in the field research program's second year, both in how fieldwork has informed geopolitical forecasts and the acceptance of the core curriculum by a major academic publisher, have served to validate the program's original ambitions. As the world remains complex in 2016, FPRI's field research program looks forward to a new year of opportunities to bring back insights from the ground, and teaching others how to increase their chances of doing the same.

### THINK TANKS AND FOREIGN POLICY PROGRAM

### Director: James McGann

For 30 years, FPRI Senior Fellow <u>Jim McGann</u> has been studying think tanks – first, as a program officer for the Pew Charitable Trusts, then for his dissertation (*Scholars*, *Dollars*, *and Public Policy*), and then as the author of reports on trends in think tanks, initially in the US but later all over the world. Subsequently, he established a database on thousands of think tanks, and about 10 years ago created the Global Go-To Think Tank Index, which ranks think tanks all over the world – and which is covered by media all over the world. More recently, he initiated a series of think tank summits, and has held

one or more summits on almost every continent. When you consider the entire evolution of this project since *before* its inception, it is a stunning trajectory – and it is not over. McGann is currently director of the <u>Think Tanks and Civil Societies Project</u> at UPenn's Lauder Institute and has written a number of books on the subject.

### **COLLABORATIONS**




### **PUBLICATIONS**

- GEOPOLITICUS: THE FPRI BLOG. *Geopoliticus* offers an outlet for quick turnaround, shortform insights, observations, or comments on a particular trend, idea, or event.

Our dear friend and long-time trustee Jack Templeton passed away on May 16, 2015 at the age of 75. He was a humble and gentle man who will be very sorely missed. A man of deep religious faith, Dr. Templeton sponsored FPRI's Annual Templeton Lecture on Religion and World Affairs for almost two decades. We are put on this earth with but one mission: to make the world a better place. Jack fulfilled this mission with grace, passion, and generosity.

The Templeton Lecture on Religion and World Affairs was established in 1996, with a gift from John M. Templeton, Jr.,

M.D., President of the John Templeton Foundation. In 1995, Dr. Templeton retired from his medical practice to serve full-time as president of the Foundation. He trained in pediatric surgery under Dr. C. Everett Koop at the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia. After serving two years in the U.S. Navy, in 1977 he returned to CHOP, where he served on the staff as pediatric surgeon and trauma program director. He also served as professor of pediatric surgery at the University of Pennsylvania. Dr. Templeton has published numerous papers in medical and professional journals, in addition to two books, A Searcher's Life and Thrift and Generosity: The Joy of Giving.

#### ISLAM IN CHINA

Xingjiang, the predominantly Muslim northwestern province of China, has been the scene of clashes between Uighurs and the Chinese government in recent years that have attracted wide international notice. The actual experience of Chinese Muslims, however, is much broader and varied than that one example suggests. Of China's 55 recognized minorities, ten are predominantly Muslim, with the Huis and the Uighurs constituting the largest groups. One of the nation's leading scholars of Islam in China Dru Gladney has examined the variety of Islamic experience and argues that there is a distinctly "Asian Islam."

Dr. Marvin Wachman (1917-2007) was a great advocate for educating young people. In a distinguished academic career, he served as president of both Temple University and Lincoln University and led the Foreign Policy Research Institute as president from 1983 to 1989. Throughout his life, he remained a passionate believer that "you never stop learning."

As president of FPRI, Marvin established our Inter-University Seminar on Foreign Affairs, bringing together faculty from the region's 60-plus institutions of higher learning. Upon his retirement in 1989, we established the Wachman Center, which is dedicated to improving international and civic literacy in the community and in the classroom. Over the years, we've developed professional development programs for high school teachers, beginning locally with our Global Classroom project but eventually expanding nationally through our Butcher History Institute. From the Inter-University Seminar, we developed several lecture series for the public in Philadelphia, the Main Line, Princeton, and New York City, as well as study groups. We also run a weekly seminar during the summer for our interns.

The Center published Footnotes, an electronic bulletin that explores the historical dimensions of current events. These have been reprinted in The American Educator and in the Federal Government's Education Resources Information Center, as well as elsewhere. The Footnotes are typically from the write-ups of lectures at our history weekends for teachers, and while they are designed for teachers and students, we find that laypeople profit from reading them as well. From time to time, we have worked with Mason Crest, a publishing firm whose main market consists of institutions serving pre-collegiate students.

# THE MADELEINE & W.W. KEEN BUTCHER HISTORY INSTITUTE

Named in honor of FPRI's longest serving trustee and his wife, the Butcher History Institute "teaches the teachers" by advancing their knowledge of world affairs, aiding them in incorporating this knowledge in the classroom, and by encouraging them to converse with scholars, writers, and other leaders. Since 1996, we have worked with over 1,000 teachers from more than 750 high schools across 47 states!

Each weekend-long program provides some 40 educators from around the country with the opportunity to learn directly from the top scholars in their fields on subjects teachers are often under-prepared to teach. Many more teachers access the videos, reports, classroom lessons, and other materials posted on our website.

Typically, at the end of a weekend, the teachers tell us that the conference was "the best professional development experience of my career."

Its work is primarily but not exclusively focused in five core areas:

- Teaching Military History
- Teaching Asia
- Teaching the Middle East
- Teaching 9/11
- Teaching the History of Innovation

In 2015, for the first time, we held a week-long program for 28 high school teachers at a venue outside the US – namely, South Korea, where teachers were immersed in Korean history and culture. Deemed an invaluable experience by all who participated, we hope to replicate this experience in other countries as well.

#### Thinking Out Loud about the Future of Identity in the Middle East

## KOREA HISTORY INSTITUTE

FPRI was pleased to offer a special one-week study program for a group of secondary social studies teachers – 7 days in South Korea. Teachers experienced South Korea through a combination of academic study and travel within the country. Teachers studied the Korean War and the sixty-plus years since the war. Participants toured historic sites and gained a better understanding of Korean culture. From Seoul in the northwest to Gyeongju in the southeast, participants experienced a real immersion into life in Korea. From the DMZ to Buddhist Temples to early historical sites, participants experienced an intimate view of Korea.

The program was led by Mark Peterson and Paul Dickler. Peterson is Associate Professor of Asian and Near Eastern Languages, Brigham Young University, where he teaches Korean language, literature and history. He received his Ph.D. from Harvard University in East Asia Languages and Civilization and directed the Fulbright Program in Korea from 1978 to 1983. Dickler is Associate Director of FPRI's Wachman Center, a retired social studies teacher of 30 years' experience, and an avid traveler (including many study trips to South Korea). He received his doctorate from the University of Pennsylvania's School of Education.







## INTERNSHIP PROGRAM

A summer at FPRI can be a turning point in a young person's life.

Mentorship is one of the pillars on which FPRI stands. The Institute prides itself in providing training to its interns – mostly college students, but some high school students as well – in research and policy analysis, editorial and verbal skills, and in the field of international relations broadly.

FPRI interns have gone on to hold key posts in the US government, including first US Ambassador to Kosovo, Coordinator for Counterterrorism in the State Department, Special Advisor to the Chairman of the



Joint Chiefs of Staff, Strategic Advisor to the Commander of Cyber Command, even Undersecretary of Defense. Also, as of this writing, one FPRI senior fellow, one FPRI Fox Junior Fellow, and one Harvey Sicherman Scholar at FPRI are all former interns.

From time to time, we are proud to showcase exceptional work produced by FPRI interns – in the form of blog posts, E-Notes, infographics, or even podcasts and E-books. These works are featured on a new page of the FPRI website known as Intern Corner.

#### SUMMER SESSIONS: AN FPRI PODCAST

One example of the innovative work produced by our interns is "Summer Sessions: A Podcast on the Thoughts and Experiences of FPRI's 2015 Summer Interns." Created and produced by University of Chicago undergraduate Sam Koffman, "Summer Sessions" was a podcast designed to capture the experience of interning at the



Foreign Policy Research Institute. In it, Summer 2015 interns discussed their projects, the value of FPRI and its research, and how they planned on using their experiences in their future careers. From foreign policy challenges and declining US hegemony to dinner with dictators and the key to transitioning democracies, FPRI interns offered their unique perspectives on FPRI's geopolitical approach in an ever-complicated world.

# 2015 SUMMER INTERNSHIP PROGRAM

This year, in an effort to increase the educational experience of our summer internship program, our interns participated in something new. In addition to conducting their summerlong research projects, interns participated in weekly seminars led by a different FPRI scholar on a topic within their area of expertise. 



# ROBERT STRAUSZ-HUPÉ SOCIETY



FPRI's Robert Strausz-Hupé Society, named after our founder, is made up of those individuals who have included bequests to FPRI in their wills. Its current members are Robert Carr, Edward Dunham, Robert L. Freedman, Charles B. Grace, Jr., Jack O. Greenberg, Jerome Kaplan, Rocco Martino, I. Wistar Morris III, Elaine Piccolomini, Alan L. Reed, and Samuel J. Savitz.

Robert Strausz-Hupé came to the United States from Vienna in the 1920s, working in the field of investment banking. He found himself

lecturing the country on the coming Nazi threat, and became a lecturer at the University of Pennsylvania even before he earned his Ph.D. In the 1950s, he founded the International Relations Program at Penn and the Foreign Policy Research Institute, and authored the best-selling book *Protracted Conflict*, focusing on the nature of the Soviet threat. His last essay, published posthumously in 2002, was called "The New Protracted Conflict," commenting on 9/11 and beyond. From 1969 to 1989, he served as U.S. Ambassador in five posts.

He is remembered as a beloved professor who would enter the classroom, ask his graduate assistant the topic of the day, and then offer an impromptu discourse on the subject for 50 minutes without the benefit of a single note. He is widely credited with introducing "geopolitics" into the American vocabulary.



FPRI currently operates on a budget of about \$1.79 million dollars and has been rated the No. 1 Think Tank in the US for think tanks with budgets under 5 million dollars (by the Global Think Tank Index). The charts below show the percentages of how FPRI is supported and how FPRI spends its funds.
